

Death of Darling J. Walker, Esq. This old and prominent citizen, so identified through his life with Edgefield, and so universally honored for his high character and public spirit, died at his home in Beech Island, on Sunday last, aged 63.

His many friends, herein his home, will be pained to hear of the death of Col. John Hill, formerly Ordinary of our District, which occurred on the 20th July. Mr. Hill was a native of North Carolina and his family removed before the war. He died in his 85th year.

James Wise had passed into the yard, Foggier following him, who was with his gun, at half-cock, which went off and discharged its contents, twelve buckshot, into his bowels, killing him instantly.
