A Mulatto Vice-President Perhaps.

An important movement is said to be on foot among the Southern colored voters to compel the Republicans at Chicago to place the name of Sen. Bruce of Mississippi, a mulatto, on the ticket as Vice-President. This is true, we trust. It is a very proper movement.

The Philadelphia Times thus places the matter before the country:

"Milton Turner, a leading colored man and Minister to Liberia under Grant's administration, is authority for the statement that a movement has been on foot for months among the colored leaders of all sections of the country, but particularly in the South, having for its object the nomination at Chicago of United States Senator Bruce of Mississippi, a colored man, for Vice-President on the Republican ticket. A Bruce literary bureau will be opened at Washington within a few days and the Bruce boom made as big as possible. The colored people will endeavor to strike a bargain with the third-term managers, because they profess to have the greatest interest in the interest in the welfare of the colored people, and a ticket composed of Grant and Bruce would be the thing."

Timrod's Grave.

The grave of Henry Timrod, the South Carolina poet, in Trinity Church yard, Columbia, has remained unmarked since his death. An effort is now being made to erect a suitable monument to his memory. Messrs. Walker, Evans & Cogswell have in press a small memorial volume from the pen of Professor W. Rivers. This work will contain two poems and an address on the life and writings of Timrod. It has been decided to sell the book, but to send copies to such persons as may be able to probably will be willing to contribute to the purpose in view. Hon. G. S. Bryson, Professor A. Porcher, Professor J. Carlisle and Major H. S. Thompson have been appointed a committee to distribute the book and erect the monument.

And in a note to us, regarding this matter, Major Thompson, writes as follows:

"I am to act as Treasurer of the general committee, but I would ask, as it may be inconvenient for some persons to serve money to me, that you receive such contributions as may be made through you. As the book will be ready for delivery next week your early attention to the matter is requested."

"I feel sure that no apology is needed for asking your aid in this effort to honor to South Carolina's gifted son."

Dedication of the New Catholic Church in Aiken.

The ceremony of the dedication of the new Catholic Church of Aiken took place on Sunday last, and from four to five hundred visitors from Charleston and about one hundred and fifty from Augusta repaired thither to witness the imposing ceremonies. The church being so small, the congregation was a large number of visitors, an awning had been erected within the church to shelter the benches placed for the further accommodation of the crowd.

The ceremony of the church were begun at ten o'clock by opening an anthem, after which the Very Rev. D. J. Quigley dedicated the church under the title of the "Church of the Holy Cross," followed by solemn High Mass celebrated by Rev. C. B. Northrop, dean of the Mass, Rev. R. Gore, pastor of Beaufort, S. C., sub-deacon, Rev. P. L. Duffy, of the Cathedral of Charleston, Rev. J. W. Olanoff, of Charleston, was in the sanctuary during the services. The sermon was delivered by the Rev. H. P. Northrop. He showed the desire of God and his people for splendid temples to the living God, under the old dispensation, and that if allowed to continue in office, say ten more years, we will have peace and plenty at home. It has been asserted, and we all agree to it, that none of these men sought the office they held; on the contrary that they made serious sacrifices in accepting such office; and that they have not only spent their time but a large amount of their private means to serve the dear people.

In this short communication it will not be expected that your correspondent could give a detailed account of the valuable services rendered by these office-holders, but it will be done in the future. Now, under the circumstances, is it right that these martyrs should be turned out of office when they have only been in for four years? They have not yet been fully rewarded for the valuable services rendered and the great sacrifices made by them; not for one moment admitting they can be defended; and our Politicians will see that they are not defeated in the next campaign. They deserve the offices for ten years longer; and the offices should be farmed out to them for that length of time, upon the express condition that in case they should be promoted, resign, or the office should become vacant by death, their places to be filled by some of the party of the same political faith and order.

For the sake of peace, and the good of Edgefield, this is the only plan now to adopt; and our political leaders should shoulder to shoulder. And we stand obedient, and endeavor to assist them in relieving our County of all the grievous burdens they tell us are afflicted with at present, and that are in store for us, in case we disobey their orders, in the future. Go forward and make peace with your adversary quickly!

Newbury Survivors.

At the meeting of the Confederate survivors of Newbury County last Monday forty names were added to the list before reported, and it was agreed that no new names be received for the monument after the 15th instant. It was decided to insert upon the monument the names of the Confederate soldiers who enlisted from Newbury County and died or were killed in service prior to the surrender of General E. Kirby Smith. The following was submitted by Mr. O. L. Schumpert as a suitable inscription for the monument, which was adopted: "This is a record of sacred dead. They were the soldiers of the Southern Confederacy from Newbury District, South Carolina, who battled for right and perished. Thus their living comrades and they who loved them memorialize their lives on the monument which shall stand on the 30th of June. The gate of the rallying enclosure will have a nickel plate on it with the words 'Confederate Dead' cut in it. The monument will be erected in the public square."

Posting as Paupers.

Many of the statements concerning the course and condition of State politics made by Gen. Gary in his recent speech at Edgefield will be read with some surprise, and will no doubt be challenged by those who look at the events of the last four years from a less personal standpoint.
