The Court—The Sentences. After eight days of arduous labor, Judge Prosser adjourned the June Term on Tuesday afternoon last. The jury for the second week were organized on Monday, and discharged on the afternoon of the same day. The following sentences were pronounced by his Honor on Monday afternoon. They will serve also as a summary of the business done, inasmuch as a conviction followed every trial. The criminal docket was almost absolutely cleared:

Oscar Patterson and Joe Colter—horse stealing—1 year each in Penitentiary. John Simmons—grand larceny—3 years in Penitentiary. Andrew Fosy—carrying concealed weapons—10 and costs or 30 days in County Jail. Andrew Butler—carrying concealed weapons—10 and costs or 6 months in Jail. West Henderson—riot at church—fined \$20. Montgomery Henderson—riot at church—\$10 or 3 months in Jail. Davis Carpenter—riot at church—\$40 or 3 months in Jail. George Henderson—riot at church—\$50 or 6 months in Jail. 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For the Advertiser. Countryman on the Taxing of Beef, Mutton, Etc.

Messrs. Editors: On our last visit to your village, we noticed an ordinance, enacted by the present Town Council, prohibiting by fine and imprisonment, the sale of Mutton, Beef, Kid, Pork, etc., without license.

Now, Messrs. Editors, it does seem to us that this ordinance is greatly at variance with the views of thinking men in other parts of the world, where in all places, except Edgewood, Village, the struggle is against monopoly, and I do not suppose the council will contend as sensible men, that this act will do any thing less than create a monopoly.

These modern reformers upon their advent into office, so we are informed, took from the revenue of the Town four hundred dollars by lowering the municipal tax on Bar-rooms. Now I suggest to this wise, progressive council, that they also prohibit the sale of Chickens, Eggs, Butter, Oats, Corn, Cotton and everything else brought to your City by our outside barbarians. Or to make it more complete, establish tolls on all the approaches to the sacred precincts of your village, and exact a price from all country people who desire to sell their wares, and allow free passage to all who are so fortunate as to have a little ready money to spend. For this Ordinance can mean nothing less than a proclamation that you country people can spend your money here, but you shall not sell your wares.

In this connection, we would like to ask, Messrs. Editors, if the Town Council, or some of its members, are not interested in the liquor traffic. And are they or some of them interested indirectly—of course—in this Beef and Mutton monopoly?

We ask these questions, because this whole business, in taxing the necessities of life like liquor may be a cheap snaffle of a ring in the interest of a few men, the expense of the many. And we are so much convinced of this by conversations with—well—we believe—a majority of the respectable taxpayers of the village, who are not only opposed to, but indignant at this outrage being perpetrated upon them.

Therefore, Messrs. Editors, tell the people from the County, who spend their money in your village, remember the names of those who constitute your present Council, and who have proclaimed their motto to be "High Defiance to the Whiskey." COUNTYMAN.

An Ordinance. Passed by the Town Council of Edgefield, June 15th, 1881.

That from and after the first day of July, 1881, it shall not be lawful for any person to sell, or to expose for sale, within the incorporated limits of Edgewood, any Beef, Mutton, Kid, or Pork, without first obtaining a license from the Town Council of Edgewood; and any person or persons who shall sell or expose for sale, within the incorporated limits of Edgewood, any Beef, Mutton, Kid, or Pork, without having first obtained a license from the Town Council of Edgewood, shall, for each offence, be liable to a fine of five dollars, and in default of paying the said fine, shall be imprisoned for the term of five days in the County Jail.
