Thirty-one sections of the bill were taken up and discussed. The interests of the roads were well presented, and seemed to make a strong impression. It seemed to be the general view of the conference that the commissioners appointed under the bill should be paid by the State.

As this important bill progresses, we will report it.

THE NEW ELECTION LAW. Flerce Opposition to the Registration Feature.

Among the important questions which are now engaging the attention of the General Assembly is the new Election Law, as recommended by the Joint Committee appoint d at the last session. The commission consisted of W. H. Perry and J. C Maxwell of tl. Senate; E. B. Murray, Edward Mc Crady, C. J. C. Hutson and J. W Gray, of the House.
