

MEETING OF THE COUNTY EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

A CONVENTION CALLED TO MEET ON THE SIXTEENTH OF MAY.

An Address to the Democrats of Edgefield.

On Monday last, the Democratic Executive Committee of Edgefield held its first meeting with reference to the coming campaign.

FELLOW CITIZENS: The official term of office of the Executive Committee of the Democratic Party of Edgefield County will soon terminate.

Resolved, That the Attorney-General of the United States be, and he is hereby, directed to forward to the Senate a copy of his letter of instructions to Dallas Saunders, Esq., of Pennsylvania, assistant counsel to the district attorney of South Carolina, under date March 18, 1882, and the reply of Mr. Saunders thereto.

He is now in Charleston for the purpose of taking part in the defence of our political prisoners.

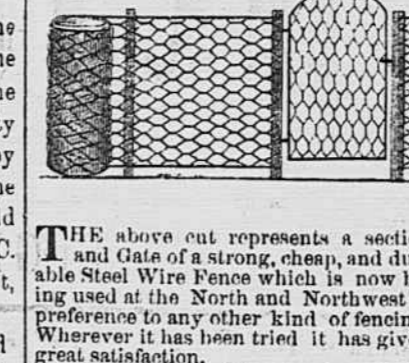
