At the present rate, the employees of the Clerk's office will soon become acquainted with the name and age of every horse and mule in the county. "One horse, Charlie, of the age of nine years." "One gray mare, Maggie, eleven years old." "One mouse-colored mare, named 'Kiv,' age unknown."

We are sorry to see this: although, under present circumstances, we dare say it is almost unavoidable.

Our farmers would do better to borrow money at even 12 per cent, and pay cash for their supplies than to pay from 25 to 40 per cent. advance for supplies on a lien. Even the merchants should prefer selling cheap; for cash at high prices on a lien. Farmers, you cannot get from under the rule until you purchase the most rigid economy in store purchases; raise your own hog and hominy this year to make your next crop with; and regulate your expenses upon a short crop basis, instead of calculating upon a full crop, and spending up to it, at large numbers of you have done for years past.
