



Parents are entitled if soldier left neither widow nor child.provided soldier died in service, or from effects of service, and they are now dependent upon their own labor for support. It makes no difference whether soldier served or died in late war or in regular army or navy. Soldiers of the late war, pensioned under one law, may apply for

higher rates under other laws, without losing any rights. Thousands of soldiers drawing from \$2 to \$10 per month under the old law, are entitled to higher rates under new law, not only on account of disabilities for which now pensioned, but also others,
