Gov. Altgeld's Views. Gov. Altgeld of Illinois, spoke at Cooper Institute New York on last Saturday.

"To elect Bryan," he said, in answer to a question, "we need only the South and Minnesota. We'll get those States sure."

"What is your idea of the West-ern situation?" the reporter asked. "Hanna has gone into it with the determination to buy every-thing in sight," was the reply.

"He has agents in ever factory and every boarding house, and they all have money to burn."

"Free passes to places where demon-strations are to be held are given to workmen with the intima-tion that they had better go, and in at least one instance, in Joliet, all the men in a factory were ordered to report at a train that took them to parade in Chicago."

"In Springfield they even went so far as to give every man they could get hold of a hat, a cane, and a campaign shirt."

"Our people are not spending money. They have'n't to spend, but two days registration in Chicago shows that they don't need it, for 200,000 men put their names on the lists, and most of them are ours."

"We're going to bury the Hanna crowd under 60,000 votes in Illinois. They can and probably will buy up 10,000 votes in the State, and they will use on others the kind of moral suasion 'resent which means the loss of a job. But that won't make a difference."

"I tell you that Hanna will be swept off the American continent. He can't get anything unless he can buy it."

BURNED TO DEATH IN A WRECK.

Most Heart-rendering Accident on the Southbound. Engineer Misread His Order and Collision Resulted. One Man Burns to Death Before the Eyes of All.

Savannah, Ga., Oct. 14.—Passenger train No. 35 from the north, due here at 4.50 a. m., and train No. 36, leaving here last night at 11.25 on the Florida Central and Peninsula railroad came together near Swansea, 120 miles from here this morning at 8.05 o'clock.

W. E. Ulmer, a passenger on the wrecked train, is missing and is undoubtedly among the killed. Ulmer was last seen standing between the first and second class coaches.

Lines death was a horrible one. He was not killed outright, but was caught under trunks and other wreckage. His cries for help attracted attention and an effort was made to rescue him.

Two Officers Dead, Two Dying—One Murderer Killed, the Other Captured. Columbus, Ga., Oct. 14.—About 2:30 o'clock this afternoon J. A. White, a shoemaker and Henry White, his son, foully murdered two policemen on Thirteenth street, this city and fatally wounded another on Sixteenth street, shortly afterward.

Richard Adams was the officer who summoned the two men to court and immediately after he presented them with the subpoenas, both men armed themselves and returned to Rumsey's bar on Thirteenth street near where Adams was standing.

Train No. 35 left Columbia over an hour late and was instructed to wait at Swansea, twenty three miles south of Columbia, for No. 36. The engineer of No. 35 read his order "Sweden," a station thirty miles further on, instead of "Swansea."
