Mr. Editor: The utterance of Oliver Wendell Holmes, "I find the great thing in the world is not so much where we stand, as in what direction we are moving," is worthy our reflection at this juncture. As a town we have been just standing for a long period. Simply standing means stagnation, stagnation means decay, death. Let us move in the direction that leads to permanent prosperity, and not in the direction that leads inevitably to ruin. The foundation of real progress and prosperity is a good well established school. This we have had for the past year, and can have for many years to come, if we will do as all up-to-date towns have done and are doing—provide buildings necessary for conducting a good school.

Parents, citizens, this is a duty you owe not only to the children of to-day, but to posterity, a responsibility that should not be ignored, a duty not to be shirked. Although we had what some are disposed to call a defeat in the mass meeting, we can, if the proper and legal course is pursued, provide the necessary buildings for the school. Had the meeting recently held been composed only of qualified and legal voters of the town of Edgefield (not county) then I should concede the action of that meeting to be just and irrevocable. As many voted who could not legally exercise that prerogative let justice be done by allowing every qualified white voter to express himself by ballot.

This is a crisis in Edgefield's history. On the ultimate solution of this school question hangs our destiny. Shall it be weal or woe? Those citizens who have repeatedly been the recipients of honor, and the consequent emoluments at the hands of Edgefield's constituency, are now expected to show their appreciation by action, exercise of influence and leadership in this school issue, an issue of so vital importance to our community.

Sirs, we have a right to expect this and require it at your hands. On your side rests the obligation. Hon. J. C. Sheppard, by virtue of your position as an influential citizen, large property owner, and your personal interest in the school, and having already accepted the leadership in this matter, we naturally expect...
