Those who travel on the railroads in South Carolina will from today pay less fare than heretofore, the rate having been reduced from four cents a mile to three cents a a mile. The new rate will go into effect tomorrow.

Some time ago the State railroad commission ordered a reuction in the passenger rate on all railroads operating in this State and as the result the firstclass fare has been reduced to three cents a mile. The secondclass fare has been abolished.

The fare from Charleston to Columbia will be \$3.89 and the fare from Charleston to Savannah will be \$3.45.




