Astronomers from all over the world gathered on the Island of Sumatra to make observations. Thirteen from the United States traveled half way round the world to avail themselves of this rare opportunity.

Furman University is to try the experiment of a Summer Law School. Prof. G. B. Moore is in charge and Hon. Joseph D. McCullough of Greenville and the venerable Joseph Daniel Pope, professor of law at the South Carolina College in Columbia, will be among the members of the faculty.

A sensation was caused in San Francisco on last Friday by the discovery of a dozen sticks of dynamite in the basement of a theater, which the Presidential party had been invited to visit. Enough explosives were there to demolish the block. Besides the dynamite was a quantity of insulated wire, and electrical apparatus, apparently to be used in setting it off.

BAD NEWS FOR STATE VETERANS.

Columbia, May 17.—The State Supreme Court to-day fixed the amount that would be available for Confederate pensions at \$100,000. This will be a source of great disappointment to the old soldiers and very many others. It will be remembered that the Act passed at the last session of the General Assembly fixed the appropriation at "at least \$150,000," while the general Appropriation Act only carried an appropriation of \$100,000. The sentiment and vote of the General Assembly was that the pension fund this year should be \$150,000.
