A DISASTROUS FIRE.

The S. C. C. I. Building and a Portion of the Contents now in a Mass of Ruins.

The imposing Tompkins building, the home of the S. C. C. I., is in ashes. The soot begrimed chimneys stand as mute sentinels over the remains of the once beautiful structure which was ruthlessly devoured by the flames.

The fire alarm was sounded about 10 o'clock on Monday morning and as the building for a month and a half caught in a mystery.

It soon became evident that the building was doomed, so all hands—a hundred or more—set about to save Col. Bailey's property, the contents of the building. A great deal was saved while much was destroyed. Three pianos were carried safely out, two new ones were burned. In one hour after the fire began the building was in ashes.

The barn of Mr. James T. Bacon was burned and his and Mr. James E. Hart's home narrowly escaped being burned.

The loss is estimated at nearly \$20,000, of which \$12,000 was covered by insurance. Mr. D. A. Tompkins had \$8,000 on the building and Col. F. N. K. Bailey had \$3,000 on his furniture, etc., and \$1,000 on barn and stables, which were burned.

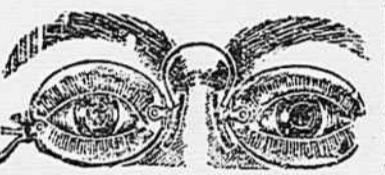
