It was with deep regret that our community received the intelligence of an accident which happened to Mrs. M. N. Holstein, of Monetta. On Friday last while walking on a newly scoured floor she slipped and fell, fracturing her left hip. Although the injury is not a serious one, yet it is very painful and will require longer to heal than a similar injury to a younger person. Mr. and Mrs. M. A. Taylor, Mrs. Kate Lynch and Miss Lena Holstein hastened to the bedside of their mother. Mrs. Holstein's Edgefield friends hope for her speedy recovery.

Two Good Reasons

While the writer was discussing the cotton outlook several days ago with Mr. J. W. Miller, who resides near Trenton, than whom there is no more successful planter in the county, the latter stated that in his opinion the south will never again produce a crop of cotton sufficiently large to cause the price to decline much below what it is bringing at present. In the opinion of Mr. Miller there are two things that preclude the possibility of so large a crop: impoverished lands and worthless labor. He says that the selling of millions of tons of seed annually from the farms has exhausted the fertility of the cotton lands to such an extent that no more record breaking crops can be made. Mr. Miller never sells seed at any price and frequently buys them to fertilize with. And as to the demoralized condition of labor, every farmer is made to realize that every day in the year.

Order and System

In accomplishing a given piece of work in a given time nothing is more telling than order and system. This is clearly demonstrated in the erection of the college building. The large force of hands is well organized, each man having a certain duty assigned him and he is required to perform it promptly and properly. Everything moves smoothly, without a jar or friction. Ten hours constitute a day's work and the men are up every morning the foreman calls out, "right boys" and the listless, lounging, chaotic mass of workmen who are waiting for the signal to start with a quick step, each to his respective post of duty. The stillness is broken by the ring of the trowel, the buzz of the saws, the blows of the hammers, the squeaking of wheel barrows, the rattle of the bricks and the melody of songs from the laborers. Several mornings ago the writer heard Contractor Spencer say to a belated workman: "If you can't come on time do not come at all. Your coming after 11:30 places my men on the work doing everything out of adjustment." Would that all work, and especially farm work, could be carried on with the same order and system. In order to receive profitable returns from labor the greatest amount of work possible must be done in the shortest possible time. Contractor Spencer is cognizant of this fact is why everything around him moves with military precision and cadence.
