WHAT ARE THE MUNICIPAL LAWS OF EDGEFIELD?

The town council very properly passed an ordinance on January 26th which divides Edgefield into six wards. Notwithstanding the fact that this is the most important measure that has emanated from the council chamber in some years, and one which deeply condoubt if ten per cent of our citidoubt if ten per cent of our citizens know in which ward they reside, or can define its boundaries. Why this lack of information? It is because the council, instead of publishing the ordinances in a local paper, as is done in most towns, post them in certain places where sundry advertisements, mortgage foreclosure notices, etc., are posted, consequently but few people ever see or know anything about them.

If it be necessary or desirable to give publicity to these municipal laws, and certainly it is, then it becomes the duty of the council to employ the means that will reach the greatest number of people. It is true that it will cost more to publish than to post these ordinances, but better results are and faithful in the discharge of their obtained thereby. In other matters the council expends money for whatever gives the best results. Why not in this?

Prior to some months ago all ordinances were published. Then, people knew what the laws were. but now a new ordinance may be passed and citizens violate it without knowing that such an ordinance existed. In view of the fact that our people have been taught to depend upon general and parted brothers.

Of the two means, the former, that of publishing the ordinances in one of the local papers, is preferable. Then those who come in from the country would be informed as to the laws of our town. 
