Surely the people of Edgefield county will be surfeited in the matter of voting this year. Every office from coroner to president, except Judge of Probate, is to be filled. To the latter office the worthy Judge J. D. Allen has, we might say, been elected in perpetuity.

The State Democratic convention was composed of representative men from every nook and corner in South Carolina, whose deliberations were characterized by the utmost harmony. Practically no change was made in the constitution and rules of the party. A very comprehensive platform, renewing allegiance to the bedrock principles of Democracy and setting forth the attitude of the party in South Carolina upon certain national issues, was adopted. The eighteen delegates to the national convention were unanimously elected and will vote as a unit. The four delegates at large to the St. Louis convention being Senator B. R. Tillman, Governor D. C. Heyward, R. Goodwin Rhet and Gen. Willie Jones. The two delegates from the 2nd congressional district being Hon. J. C. Sheppard and Capt. Claude E. Sawyer.
