
The heavy draft horse is one of the most profitable classes of horses that the farmer can raise. He should weigh from 1800 pounds upward-the more the better, provided it is conducive with quality and good feet and legs. The body should be deep, wide and strong, coupled with shortness of back and the muscling of the lion. Good action is essential, as indicated by the length of stride, quickness of step and straightaway movements.

WARMED GRAIN FOR POULTRY. Mention has been made in this department of the plan of the writer in feeding whole corn to fowls at night and having it almost hot. This winter we have made it a practice to feed all whole grain only after warming. It was found that the nights the fowls were given the hot corn they were happy and warm, while on other nights, when other grains were fed in their rotation in the ration, the fowls were more or less restless and did not


settle down to sleep so soon. A little though: made it apparent that the birds missed the warm food, just as a human would miss it, and that their stomachs were no more pleased with a cold supper on a cold night than the stomach of the feeder would be. This plan of feeding together, with the plan of having all water given the fowls warmed, nearly hot, works nicely, as any one will see who will try it.

TENDENCY OF BREEDS.

It should be borne in mind in breeding that the proper type is what should be simed at, and not simply breed, bad as well as good. Plymouth Rocks can be raised, but the correct type of this breed should be aimed at. The English Dorking is recognized as the best type of fewl, and all breeders are trying to produce this style. The points to aim at are prominent, long, yet square, breasts, short legs, but with good width between. Lew set birds with good breasts are wanted, and these are the best to fatten. The utility type as against the purely exhibition is gradually forcing its way to the front. The broad and blocky Buff Orpington, showing the shortest legs of any bird is a case in point. It is impossible to sar which breed of birds are the best layers. It is the best to breed from the birds which you notice are the best egg producers from your own observe. tion.-Maritime Farmer.

TWO HANDY TOOLS. i The illustration shows two tools

which will be found useful on any farm where fruits and vegetables are grown. The rakelike tool is an onion row marker and will save an immense amount of time in setting onions if used as directed. Take a piece of material three feet long and about two inches square and, after boring suitable holes four inches apart, set in and Tasten pins of wood so that they will project about two inches. These pins should be about one-half inch square and bluntly pointed. Attach a short handle as shown and the tool is ready.

To use set the marker on the line laid out for the row and, with the foot, press lightly down so as to make a shallow hole to indicate where the onion set is to go. The other tool is a tree pruner and is made by taking a hardwood pole six feet long and one and one-quarter inches in diameter and rounding it. An old fork handle will do nicely for the purpose. Buy a good one and one-quarter inch is kept sharp it will easily cut a limb a half inch in diameter and it will be found very useful in working where it would be very troublesome to place a knife or a handsaw.

A DIGESTIVE FOR HORSES.

'As nearly all horses are troubled with indigestion, due largely to sameness in rations, and many are subject to attacks of colds, it is a good plan to have on hand some simple digestive which may be mixed with the feed given the horse. Horses that are subject to stomach disturbances should be given bran mashes several times a week, at night, and oats should constitate a very considerable portion of their grain ration. In feeding the bran mashes mix in each a tablespoonful of powdered charcoal. If the animal obfects to it at first, reduce the quantity and then increase to the quantity named. Horses subject to colic should be carefully worked, and if such attacks appear with any regularity, daily exercise should take the place of work and the horse be treated by a veterinarian. Try this charcoal treatment, do it regularly, and you will find the digestive organs of the horses much

Our Taste For Chocolate. The taste of the people of the United States for cacao and chocolate appears to be developing with rapidity. Figures compiled by the Department of Commerce and Labor show that the importation of cacao has grown from pine million pounds in 1883 to twentyfour million pounds in 1893, and sixtythree million pounds in 1903. Cacao, as is well understood, is the product of the cacao tree, which grows wild in tropical America, and is also much cultivated there, and to some extent in Asia and Africa. The fruit of this tree, a pear-shaped pod from five to ten inches in length, contains numerquu large seeds from which the chocolate of commerce is produced, while the shells are also utilized for the decoction known as cacao, or cocoa, used as a substitue for tea or coffee. It is the crude cacao, leaves and shells which form the large and rapidly growing importation above referred to, which has increased from nine million pounds in 1883 to sixty-three million pounds in 1903. The value of importation of cacao in this crude form has grown from one million dollars in 1883 to four million dollars in 1893. and nearly eight million dollars in 1903.-Harper's Weekly.

Hopeless Struggle

HE CREATED QUITE A SENSATION COTTON BELT WILL BE PLAGUED

W. D. Hunter, the Department of Agriculture Expert, Thinks That Fist Likely to Cause an Early Price Increase and Ultimately to Do \$250,000,000 Annual Damage.

Washington, Special.-Some signifi-

cent official predictions regarding the

favages of the cotton boll weevil are made in a report soon to be issued by the Department of Agriculture, and written by W. D. Hunter, Who has charge of the entomological part of the boll weevil investigation, in which half a hundred experts are now engaged. Mr. riunter says that conservative authorities agree that unless contingencies at present unexpected occur, the pest soon will cause an increase in the price of cetton throughout the world. By living within the ffuit of the plant, the weevil is well protected from any poisons that might be applied; it occupies but fourteen days for development from egg to adult, and the progelly of a single pair in a season may reach 134,000,000 inconditions and is remarkably free from parasites and diseases, All com-bining to make entires at control dif-ficult. The report estimates that the presence of the weevil practically doubles the area of land required to produce a bale of cotton, and that the weevil caused the Texas planters a loss of about \$15,000,000 in 1903. As suming \$500,000,000 as the value of the normal cotton crop of the county, Mr. Hunter says the probable ultimate damage when the pest has become spread over the entire belt would approximate \$250,000,000 annualty, providing nothing were done to check it. Planters, however, are adopting changes in methods, tend to avoid so much damage. report predicts that the weevil eventually will be distributed all over the cotton belt, advancing into new territory at the rate of approximately 500 miles a decade, and it probably always will be as destructive in a series of years as it has been in Yours since 1894. The report suggests that the probability of its being carried to West Africa or elsewhere abroad is

nothing to prevent the weevils from being carried long distances on shipboard, as they are able to adapt themselves successfully to climatic conditions. It is pointed out, however, that the danger could be avoided by fumigation, or by leaving the seed sacked in store-rooms, isolated from new cotton for a year previous to shipment.

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
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
