OFFICE OF THE COUNTY OF SUPERINTENDENT OF EDUCATION.

Edgfield, S. C., June 25th, 1904. The County Summer School for White Teachers will be opened at Edgfield, S. C., on Tuesday August 2nd, 1904 at 12 m. and will close on the 30th day of August. The County Board of Education earnestly requests all teachers who expect to teach in the free Public Schools of the County to attend the Summer School, and to encourage them to attend, have passed the following resolutions:

That the County Board of Education do aid those teachers of the County who taught last Session and who expect to teach the coming Session, and who feel that they are not financially able to bear the expense of attending the Summer School, to the extent of ten dollars to aid them in paying Board and furnish them with necessary books. The teachers who desire to take advantage of this offer must enroll at the opening of the term, attend regularly, and stand examination at the end of the school. We have urged the trustees to employ those teachers who are endeavoring to equip themselves as far as possible in their profession. Certificates are not renewable unless the holder attends Summer School.
