If the members of the Presbyterian, Methodist and Baptist churches in Edgefield county will do their full duty as professing Christians, in less than sixty days the dispensary will be closed and not a drop of liquor will be sold within the borders of the county.

We trust that the mass meeting to be held in the court house on Monday next will be a large and representative one, all classes and all sections being represented.

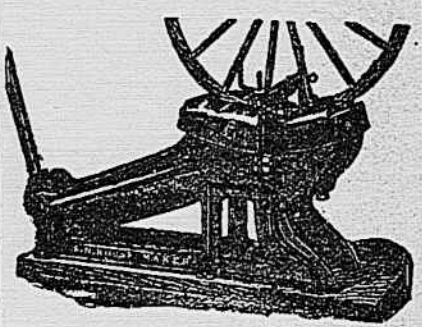

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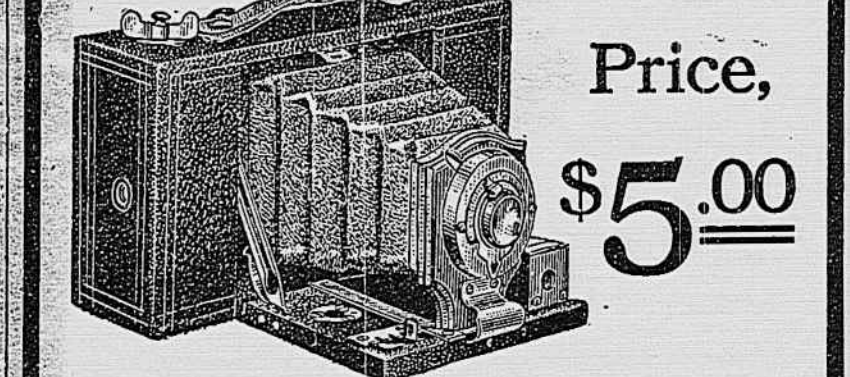
