NOT HIS TIME TO DIE.
Railroad Man Lives to Tell of Miraculous Escape.

John Flockhart of South Chicago was run over by a switch engine and five cars in the local yards of the Big Four railway the other day, and still lives. Flockhart, who was formerly employed as a Big Four switchman, came to Kankakee on a picnic excursion. In the afternoon he was riding on the front end of a switch engine with two former fellow employees, when his horse fell. In trying to catch it he lost his balance and fell directly in front of the engine. The engine and five cars in the train passed over him. The crew crawled back, expecting to find the mangled corpse of their companion, but instead he was endeavoring to raise himself to a sitting posture. Examination showed that his injuries consisted of a crushed right arm and a few cuts about the head, while the heel of his right foot had been torn off. The injured man was removed to the hospital. Local railroad men are unable to account for Flockhart's escape from instant death, as the firebox of the engine reaches almost to the ground. It is thought that after his arm was crushed by the engine he was rolled into the center of the tracks, clear of the wheels of the cars that followed.

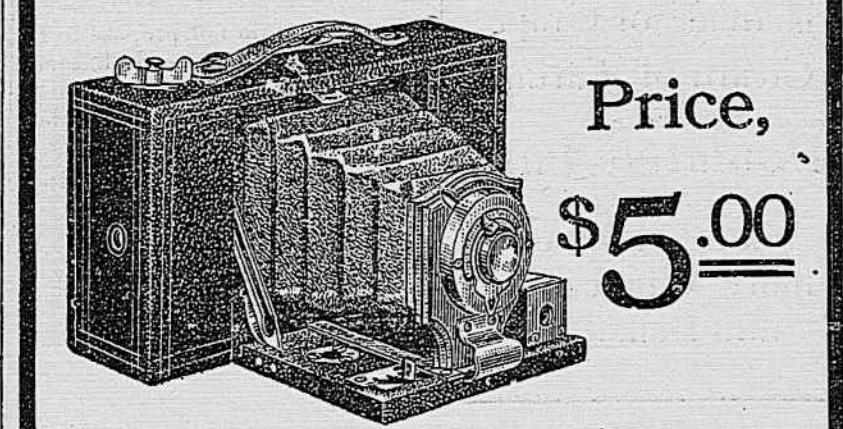
Tin-Type Snapshots.

May Restrains Election.
Gaffney, Special.—C. P. Sims, of the firm of Sims & Hannon, Spartanburg, appeared before Judge Klugh here and secured an order to the authorities in Spartanburg to show cause before him in Gaffney next Monday, November 6th why the superintendents and managers of election should not be enjoined from holding the election to decide the question of "dispensary" or "no dispensary."

The plaintiff in this case is J. W. Harmon, one of the county dispensers, while the defendants are D. M. Miles, in his own right and as supervisor of Spartanburg county, and E. E. Bishop, J. W. Bishop et al., managers of election, in their own right and as managers of election to be held in Spartanburg county, South Carolina, for the purpose, amongst other things, to vote for, or against having dispensaries in Spartanburg county.

The order is as follows: State of South Carolina, county of Spartanburg, Court of Common Pleas, J. W. Harmon, plaintiff, against D. M. Miles et al, defendants: On having read the verified complaint in the above stated case upon motion of the plaintiff, it is ordered that the defendants be required to show cause before me at the court house at Gaffney, South Carolina, on Monday, November 6th, 1905, at 10 o'clock a. m., or as soon thereafter as counsel can be heard, why an order should not be granted restraining the said defendants from holding an election in Spartanburg county, South Carolina, on November 7th, 1905, on the question of "Dispensary" or "no dispensary."
