**FRENCH CABINET OUT**

**Resignations Were All Sent in Simultaneously**

**STARTLINGLY SUDDEN DEFEAT**

**On Comparatively Minor Debate Over Church Inventory Riots Government is Defeated by Opposition, Including Both Clericals and Socialists, and Premier Rouvier and Colleagues Tender Resignations to Figure-Head President.**

Paris, By Cable.—Like a shot from a clear sky, the Rouvier Ministry was defeated in the Chamber of Deputies and immediately resigned.

The cabinet crisis comes at a dramatic moment, when the Franco-German contest has reached a decisive stage, and may exert an important adverse influence on the Algerias conference and on European affairs.

The defeat of the government came on a comparatively minor debate over the Church directors. The government succeeded in holding only 234 votes, while the various elements in opposition—Clericals, Socialists and Nationalists—united and polled 267 votes, thus placing the Ministry in a minority of 32.

Premier Rouvier, with all of his colleagues, immediately proceeded to the Foreign Office, where a joint letter of resignation was prepared. Later, M. Rouvier presented this letter to President Fallieres, who accepted the resignation. The President announced his intention of consulting the Presidents of the Senate and Chamber of Deputies relative to the formation of a new cabinet.

**BLOODY RIOT FORMED TOPIC.**  
The debate in the Chamber of Deputies was upon the bloody riot during the taking of an inventory of a church in the village of Boeseheper, resulting in the death of a manifestant.

Various orators severely criticized the government's course, asserting that it threatened to precipitate a religious warfare.

Premier Rouvier responded: "The government has the duty to apply the law. It will apply it without weakness, but also with the prudence, tact and wisdom consistent with public tranquility. I ask the adoption of a resolution approving these declarations of the government."

The resolution was thereupon put to a vote and defeated. The result was due to a combination of opposition influences. The vote was more expressive of personal antagonism to the Ministry than of opposition to church inventories.

**Named to Murder President.**  
New Orleans, Special.—Declaring that her life will be taken unless she assassinates President Roosevelt, a woman who gave her name as Mrs. W. B. Lewaller, of Philadelphia, applied at central police headquarters for protection. She spoke rationally on all general subjects, but the police coroner decided to detain her for an examination. Mrs. Lewaller said that she fell in with a party of Socialists in Philadelphia, and that she was taken to a room there and made to take an oath against the President, being told that she would be destroyed if it was not executed. She said she fled to Houston, Texas, but the men followed her there and that she had then come to New Orleans.

**Western Roads Lower Rate.**  
Chicago, Special.—Western railroads, The Record-Herald says have decided to make voluntary reductions in transportation charges amounting in the aggregate to many million dollars annually. The proposed reductions are to be made in all the rates of the six classes into which freight is divided and will be effective in the entire territory between the Atlantic seaboard and the Missouri river. In general, the reductions will amount to approximately 15 per cent.

**Not to Strike on Southern.**  
Washington, Special.—In an authorized interview H. E. Perham, of St. Louis, president of the Order of Railway Telegraphers, stated that the differences with the Southern Railway Company were being amicably adjusted and that there would be no strike on Friday as heretofore announced.

**Tennessee Republican Committee Meets.**  
Nashville, Tenn., Special.—The State Republican committee met here Wednesday and decided to call a convention to meet here August 2 next, to nominate candidates for Governor and other State officials. Lines between the so-called Evans and Brownlow factions were tautly drawn.

**CONGRESSIONAL DOINGS**

**What is Being Done Day by Day by the National House and Senate.**

**To Mark Confederate Graves.**  
The House passed the army appropriation bill, also the Foraker bill providing for the marking of the graves of Confederate dead, buried in the North.

**Dolliver Speaks for Rate Bill.**  
The discussion of the railroad rate question in the Senate was continued by Mr. Dolliver, who spoke in support of the Dolliver-Heppburn bill. He said that the bill was intended merely to supplement the existing interstate-commerce law and contended for its validity from a constitutional point of view, predicting that government ownership of the railroads would be forced upon the country if Congress did not meet the present demand for regulation.

**Coast Line Increases Stock.**  
Richmond, Va., Special.—The stock holders of the Atlantic Coast Line held a meeting and passed a resolution prepared by the board of directors authorizing the increase of the stock of the company from \$50,000,000 to \$60,000,000. A number of prominent financiers from New York, Baltimore and Wilmington, N. C., were present. The meeting lasted not quite 15 minutes.

**Justice Brown Resigns.**  
Washington, Special.—President Roosevelt has accepted the resignation of Associate Justice Brown of the United States Supreme Court. Justice Brown tendered his resignation to the President on the 2nd instant, that being his seventieth birthday. He has served on the Supreme Court bench a little more than 15 years, having been appointed by President Harrison in 1890. No indication yet is given of Justice Brown's successor.

**Defenses Urged.**  
Washington, Special.—President Roosevelt sent a message to Congress accompanying plans for coast defense prepared by a joint board of army and navy officers, in which he emphasized the necessity for further defense works in this country. The President calls special attention to the recommendation of the board that the entrance to Chesapeake Bay be added to the list of places in the United States to be defended. He says the insular possessions cannot be longer safely neglected.

**Miss Susan B. Anthony Seriously Ill.**  
Rochester, N. Y., Special.—Miss Susan B. Anthony is seriously ill at her home here from pneumonia, which developed on her return from her recent visit to Washington. She is 86 years old. For a long time Miss Anthony has been in robust health. Dr. Charles S. Sumner was called in consultation. The physicians announced later that the patient showed a slight improvement.

**Griggs Chosen Chairman.**  
Washington, Special.—Representative J. M. Griggs, of Georgia, was unanimously chosen chairman of the Democratic committee at a meeting in the capitol attended by 31 members of the committee. Representative Bowers, of Mississippi, placed Mr. Griggs in nomination. There were no other nominations and the secretary was instructed to cast the entire vote for Mr. Griggs.

**Stranded Schooner Floated Near Cape Henry.**  
Norfolk, Special.—The Merritt Company, Wednesday afternoon floated the four-masted schooner George M. Grant, which was blown ashore near Cape Henry last Tuesday afternoon. The vessel was kept afloat by her cargo of wooden railroad ties and was towed into Hampton Roads.

**In the Senate.**  
The question of the enlargement of the Medical Department occupied the major portion of the time of the Senate. The question arose in connection with the consideration of a bill for the displacement of contract surgeons by physicians who shall be given the rank of army officers and the reorganization of the medical corps. Mr. Hale criticized the bill as an entering wedge for a general increase of the army and said that it was a part of a general plan of the general staff which he charged with a general purpose of enhancing the army's importance.

**Tramp Crushed Between Bumper.**  
Payetteville, Special.—A white man was found dead with one leg cut off, Thursday, morning on the track of the Atlantic Coast Line Railway, near Luray station, four miles north of this city. He is unknown and there is nothing on his person to identify him. He had on workman's overalls and is supposed to have been a tramp stealing a ride.

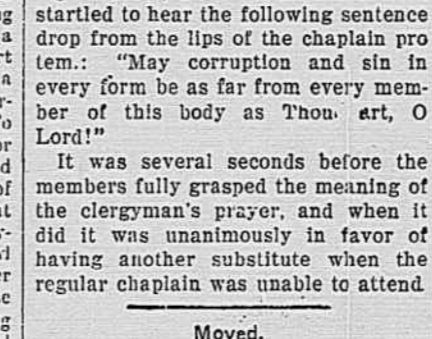
