The County Democratic Executive Committee met on Thursday and tabulated the votes of the second primary election. The vote was much larger by several hundred than many supposed it would be. 1423 ballots were cast. The following are the official figures:

For Governor: Ansel 744, Manning 670. For Attorney General: Lyon 812, Ragsdale 611. Railroad Commissioner: Sullivan 671, Wharton 741. For Supervisor: Self 739, Blocker 617. For County Commissioner: Turner 870, Griffith 545. The total number of votes received by the candidates for state office were as follows:

For Governor: Ansel 46,444, Manning 87,045. For Attorney General: Lyon 48,886, Ragsdale 34,525. For Railroad Commissioner: Sullivan 47,564, Wharton 36,872. In declaring the result of the first primary the committee made an error in tabulating the vote for magistrate in the 8th district. Instead of Messrs. Whit Harling and A. C. Ouzts being in the second race, it should have been between Messrs. A. C. Ouzts and B. L. Stevens. Owing to this error, the committee did not count the vote of the second primary in the 8th district but ordered Messrs. Ouzts and Stevens to run again, the election to be held on September 26th. In view of all the circumstances, this was the wise and proper course for the committee to pursue. Ye voters in the 8th judicial district of Edgfield county, prepare your ballots for the election to be held on the 25th inst. No printed tickets will be provided, so the voters will write their ballots.

Letter to C. W. Watson. Edgfield, S. C. Dear Sirs: If you could get the exclusive sale of a sweeter sugar for five miles round—1/2 lb as sweet as a pound of usual sugar, and cost no more—you'd jump at it, wouldn't you? There wouldn't be 100 lb of any other sugar sold in a year in your town; you'd gobble the trade; and it wouldn't hurt your whole business.
