Edgefield Cemetery Association. A permanent organization known as the Edgefield Cemetery Association was effected at the citizens' meeting in the court house on Thursday afternoon last. A suitable constitution was adopted, and the following officers elected: Dr. C. E. Burts, president; Mrs. C. E. May, secretary, and Mrs. J. D. Holstein treasurer, were elected. The officers together with Messrs. O. Sheppard, N. G. Evans, S. McG. Simkins and B. E. Nicholson constitute the executive committee which shall be self-perpetuating.

All persons who will agree to make a contribution annually—the amount of the contribution to be fixed by the donor—are eligible to membership. It is earnestly desired that a large number of individuals, both ladies and gentlemen, will band in their names for enrollment, or consent to join when approached upon the subject by the officers or members of the executive committee.

About \$150 will be annually required to properly maintain the cemetery. Besides this, it is the purpose of those interested in the movement to raise a sufficient sum of money to enclose the cemetery with a cement or brick wall. All who attended the meeting were very enthusiastic and greatly encouraged with the outlook for the ultimate success of the undertaking. For a number of years such an organization has been one of the greatest needs of the community, especially in it needed at this time. During the past years the town authorities have to some extent looked after the keeping of the cemetery but the revenue of the town at this time being less than during former years the funds are not available for this purpose.
