Clemson Agricultural College. Scholarship and Entrance Examination to Freshman Class. The examination for the award of scholarships from Edgfield County and Admission to Freshman Class will be held at the county court house on Friday July 5, at 9 a. m. Applicants for scholarships may secure blank application forms from the county Superintendent of Education. These blanks must be filled out properly and filed with the county Superintendent before the beginning of the examination. Those taking the examination for entrance to the Freshman class and not trying for a scholarship should file their application with President Mell. The scholarships are worth \$100 and free tuition. One scholarship student from each county may select the Textile course, others must take one of the agricultural courses.
