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Camp Meeting at Epworth. The Advertiser has received a circular from Rev. W. P. B. Kinard announcing the annual camp meeting which is to be held at Epworth, near his home, from July 28th to August 6th. Every body is invited. Rev. H. C. Morrison, D. Four Score and Five Years. In the death of Dr. Horace Parker probably the oldest citizen in the county has been taken. He was in his eighty-sixth year when the final summons came. On account of delicate health, he left his home in New Hampshire sixty-odd years ago and journeyed to the Southland. Being a dentist by profession, Dr. Parker did dental work as he traveled through the country, and while stopping at Capt. James Dorn's, which was one of the principal stopping places for those who journeyed by stage from Edgfield to Cambridge, he was taken ill and was forced to remain in the home some time. Afterwards he and Miss Sarah Dorn were married. They went at first to live near Cambridge but later settled at Edgfield, where he resided continuously afterwards.

Dr. Parker practiced his profession very successfully until several years ago when on account of the infirmities of old age he was forced to retire. His latter years he spent in quiet retirement at his home two miles north of Edgfield. During a long period of his life he was a member of the Masonic fraternity and in compliance with his request his brethren laid his body to rest with the beautiful ceremonies of the Order. Seven children, three daughters and four sons, survive him.

The Hail Stricken District. Mr. L. R. Brunson was in Edgfield on Saturday and reported the crops in the hail stricken district to be doing nicely. Of course they are late, and what the harvest will be is purely conjectural, even more so than the older, uninjured crops. Mr. Brunson says some persons advised that the damaged crops be left, that they would recover and make good yields. He and others did not think that way, and time has proven their heads to be the longest—their judgment the best.

Just to see what the result would be, one of Mr. Brunson's neighbors left three rows of the damaged cotton in a field and not more than three or four stalks on the entire three rows lived. Suppose, then, farmers of that section had awaited developments and depended upon the damaged crops, they would now have practically no cotton and not all. With a late fall and the hail-stricken farmers will yet make good crops. Let us hope that Jack Frost will put in his appearance late, very late.

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A Tribute of Respect. Mrs. Rosa Florence Lake, wife of my old friend and comrade, Geo. B. Lake, was Rosa Florence Jones before her marriage, daughter of N. L. and S. E. Jones, of Georgia. She was born in Liberty county, Georgia, on the 14th of January, 1848, and married Geo. B. Lake 27th of June, 1866, when she was eighteen years of age. She died 28th of June, 1907, in the 60th year of her age, after forty one years of married life. She was the mother of eleven children, eight still living. It was my good fortune to live for a number of years a neighbor to the Lake family. I therefore had the best opportunity to form a correct estimate of the character and qualities of this noble woman. Born and reared in affluence, with every comfort that wealth and the best social surroundings could command, it would be natural to suppose she would quail before the storm of adversity and poverty which broke upon her as the result of war, but she met the shock with courage and patience of the highest and bravest order. She was a noble representative of the splendid women of the south who shed so much lustre on southern character, and set such an illustrious example for the generations that came after them. We hear of and read the fervid language of eloquent orators extolling the courage, fortitude and staying qualities of the confederate soldiers, encomiums well deserved, but their lot amid the perils of the battle field, the march, the hospital, hunger, exposure was more easily borne than the anxiety suffered by the heroic women at home. The men had excitement, diversion, novelty, moving from place to place, which, in a measure, took their minds away from their trials and troubles. The women at home tortured by the pangs of uncertainty and anxiety, watching, waiting, praying that the next message from the battle field, hospital or camp, might not come burdened with the announcement of death or wounds or illness of some member of the family near and dear to them. This required a higher order of courage than that shown by men in confederate armies. And then came "reconstruction" that dismal page in history, blackened by the vandalism of those in power. I have seen Mrs. Lake bear up splendidly when adversity and poverty stalked at her door, as at the doors of most of us. The dark shadows there cast across her path did not dim the light of her Christian faith or divert her from the straight way of duty. She reared her children in the fear of God, and cultivated their minds to bear allegiance to the truths of her Christian religion, and to the precepts of an honorable upright life. Her burial in Edgfield cemetery on Sunday, the 30th of June last, was a sad but forcible reminder of how rapidly those of her generation are passing away. The generous sympathy of the large audience in the Baptist church that day, the eloquent pathos of the remarks of the pastor, Rev. Her life and example is worth more to the generations following, than a thousand women who spend their lives pursuing the glitter and trumpery of fashion, and subordinate the plain duties of life to the frivolities which fade and pass away into nothingness. In the death of Mrs. Lake a noble woman, noble in her family, religious and social life, has passed from earth, honored and respected. "She united in herself the rare qualities of the heroine and the Christian."
