SOME INTERESTING RELICS

Shown at the Jamestown Exposition among the very interesting relics which are shown at the Jamestown Exposition will be found two old pigs from made at Providence, Forge, New Kent County, Virginia, 1780, and an embossed "B. C. 1784" and "B. C. 1789," respectively. "B. C." meaning British Colony. The law at that time forbade the working of iron in the colony beyond the pig iron state, and required same to be marked "B. C." and shipped to England in exchange for articles of utility.

After the war the armor plate of the famous "Merimac" or Virginia, which revolutionized naval warfare in the famous battle in Hampton Roads, March 8, 1862, was sold to the Old Dominion Iron and Nail Works, Richmond, Va. The armor plate was removed by divers and purchased by the Old Belle Isle company, and worked up into horse shoes and other useful articles. A piece of this armor plate, which was struck by a ball, is on exhibit at Jamestown Exposition, and some of it has been worked up into handsome souvenirs, such as miniature horse shoes, and anchors.

A BRIEF SUSPENSION GOVERNORS CONFERENCE

New Orleans Financiers Not Worrying

Exchanges Suspend Business Until Monday—Action Taken at Request of Clearing House Association.

New Orleans, La., Special.—The Louisiana stock exchange and the New Orleans stock exchange has suspended business and all actual trading on both exchanges will be suspended until Monday, August 4th.

South Financially Safe. That the South is financially safe and in position to benefit greatly from the positions of the United States is the opinion expressed by New Orleans bankers and business men.

Reports came in from rural districts in Mississippi, Alabama, Kansas and Tennessee that small banks have followed the lead of the cities and have taken united steps to protect depositors from loss of money or confidence.

Following a conference of New Orleans bankers, Charles Goddard, president of the White & Central National Bank, gave out the following:

"New Orleans and the South can be of great benefit in relieving the situation throughout the country. The East will assist by allowing some of the currency deposited with it by the government to come this way in order to move the cotton and sugar crops."

"The cotton movement is slow, owing to inability of the banks here to supply the necessary cash. The banks are buying foreign exchange liberally, getting New York exchange in payment therefor, but they will soon be at a standstill, as currency cannot be sent down to supply the needs of the country. It is our hope that the conditions in New Orleans and the immediate neighborhood will be greatly improved. This will place New York banks in possession of foreign exchange, which will obtain gold from abroad."

"The sugar crop, which promised to be large, is not a disappointment and the yield of sugar per ton of cane is fully up to expectations."

"The decision of the clearing house here to issue clearing house certificates to restrict the daily withdrawal of cash, and to enforce the 60-day rule for savings deposits, has met with unanimous approval of the community at large."

Henry B. Scribner, president of the New Orleans board of trade, said:

"Conditions throughout the South as reflected in the finances and commerce of New Orleans are most encouraging. The large movements of cotton through the ports of New Orleans, Charleston, Savannah, Wilmington and Norfolk, and large sales of other commodities to foreign points are giving a sanguine outlook for the future of the South."

Friday's conference, which was held at the suggestion of Governor Perry of Alabama, was participated in by Governors R. B. Glenn of North Carolina, B. D. Comer of Alabama, and Hoke Smith of Georgia.

Finger Prints for Banks. The idea of using the finger print system as a method of identification in the banking business has been discussed in financial circles of Baltimore, owing to the problem presented when business is transacted with foreigners unable to sign their names in English. For years American bankers have had much trouble satisfying themselves about signatures of foreigners, and to add to that the foreign patrons seldom know any one to identify them.

Believing the problem could be solved by this system, used in connection with the Bertillon bureau of the Police Department, two employees of a local savings bank called upon Lieutenant John A. Cooney recently, and discussed the plan with him. They admitted they had a deep personal interest in finger prints and that their experiments were not successful, as the ink used smeared despite the fact that the impressions were lightly made.

Lieutenant Cooney discussed the subject with them at great length, for he is an enthusiast on the system and he knows something of its history. "I felt certain it would not be long before the Baltimore banks would have to take it up," he said, "for it is the easiest and safest manner in the world to identify a person." Baltimore Sun.
