For ten years Mr. Lanham has been actively engaged in Christian work among young men. Eight years ago he severed his connection with Edgefield and cast his lot in Kentucky, accepting a position as Y. M. C. A. secretary of Muhlenburg county. After laboring very successfully in that county he was called to Harrodsburg, Ky., where he did an excellent work.

While Rev. John Lakes is looked upon as the founder of the county Y. M. C. A., Mr. Lanham has had more to do with making the movement a pronounced success than possibly any other young man in America. The work passed through the experimental stage in Kentucky under the leadership and direction of Mr. Lanham.
