There is always a good margin of profit in early lambs. Col. S. B. Mays was in town Monday arranging to ship some of his lambs, having heard that Aiken butchers are paying fifteen cents per pound gross. Col. Mays' lambs average about fifty pounds, and at the prevailing price in Aiken will bring \$7.50 each. When such prices can be realized, there is nothing on the farm that will bring larger returns than a flock of sheep. Farmers generally are awakening to the fact that stock raising of all kinds is profitable.

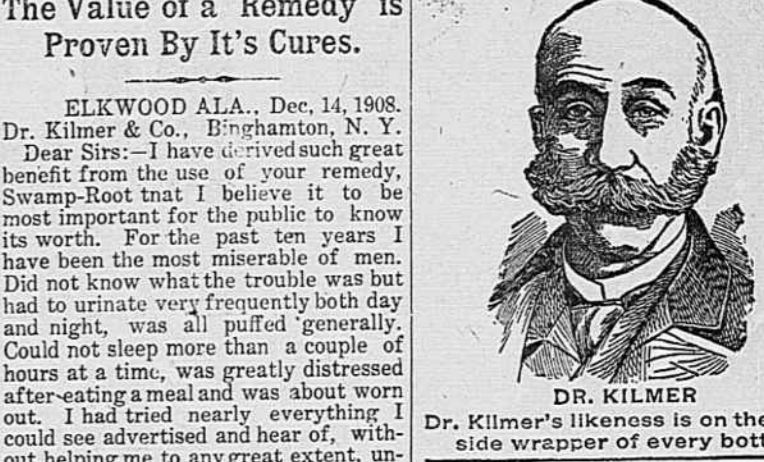
