





"For the past nine years, inclusive of 1908, the fire companies H. W. Dobey, Pres't. have collected premiums of \$12, only \$6,641,469.59. In that time the life premiums amounted to \$23,090,-732,09 and the losses to only \$8,783,-350.79. So far as the life premiums are concerned it is hardly just to state these comparisons without directing attention to the fact that the large amount of insurance in force offsets some of the great difference between the yearly premiums and the yearly losses. If South Carolina life insurance, policy holders were to cash in now and pay no more they would have many millions to their in paid up insurance and cash surrender value.

"The shake-up in insurance circles in New York a few years ago and the passage of the Armstrong law were reflected here in a decreased business, but the year 1898 showed a decided gain over the previous year, in both fire and life business. 
