New Plan For Sunday Closing.

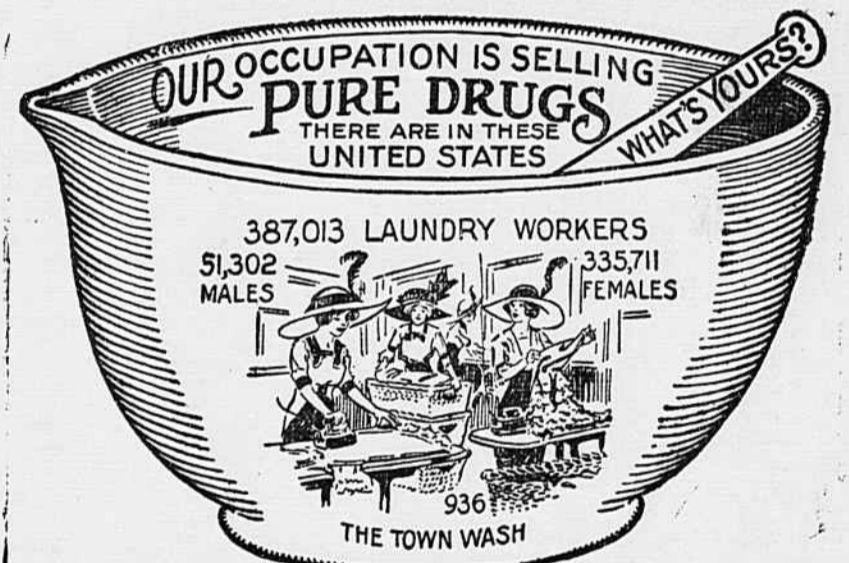
A Chicago judge reveals a new way to close saloons on Sunday. It doesn't require more police, or private espionage, or raids, or publicity, or Carrie Nation tactics, or anything else violent or troublesome. All it takes is a little personal nerve.

Two men were arrested and brought before the judge for refusing to pay for drinks they had ordered in a saloon on Sunday. And here is his honor's verdict:

"You do not have to pay for

drinks you get in saloons in Chicago on Sunday. If the saloons are open, they are open in violation of the law. They have no right to sell you liquor, and, therefore, no right to demand payment for the liquor furnished."

The question of closing the bar-rooms effectively in any city, therefore, seems quite simple. The reformers can organize a corps of martyrs who will make the rounds of the open bars, ordering drinks and refusing to pay for them, until the saloonkeepers get tired of it and close up.—Augusta Chronicle.
