Death of Mr. R. A. Cochran.

After a lingering illness extending over a period of several years, Mr. R. A. Cochran died at his home in the Rehoboth section last Wednesday afternoon. His health began to fail two or three years ago and his steady loss of strength caused his relatives and friends great anxiety. He was never confined to his bed however for any considerable length of time until he suffered a stroke of paralysis about a month ago. It appeared for a time after being stricken that he would rally and be restored to his accustomed strength but soon a change for the worse was observed by loved ones who watched so patiently and devotedly at his bedside.

The death of this good man, although he resided on the extreme western side of the county, was a distinct loss to the county as a whole. In the Civil War he rendered faithful service and during the half century that has followed Mr. Cochran was in the forefront of every good work.

He was one of the pillars of Rehoboth church, and was one of its most liberal supporters. Unless providentially kept away, Mr. Cochran was always in his accustomed place, ready to do his full share of whatever was undertaken for the promotion of the cause of Christ at home and abroad. His exemplary life was a tower of strength to his community. Everybody had confidence in Mr. Cochran, and his wise counsel was frequently sought. Rehoboth community has been made better and richer by reason of his having lived in it. The funeral was held at Rehoboth Thursday afternoon, Rev. J. T. Littlejohn officiating.

Mr. Cochran is survived by his devoted wife, one daughter, Mrs. Fannie Green, and one son, Mr. Evan Cochran.
