City Ordinance.

An Ordinance to prevent feeding of horses, mules or cattle on the public square and on Main Street in the Town of Edgefield, S. C.

Be it ordained by the Town Council of the Town of Edgefield, S. C., and by authority of the same: Section 1. That it shall be unlawful, on and after the first day of January, A. D., 1917, to feed horses, mules or cattle on the Public Square in the Town of Edgefield, S. C., or on Main Street in said Town.

Section 2. That any person or persons violating the provisions of guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not less than Five (5) nor more than Twenty-five (25) Dollars or be imprisoned in the County Jail or at" hard labor upon the streets of said Wanted large tracts of land Town for not less than five nor more than thirty days.
