In accordanci with the act approved February 20, 1917, creating a State highway department, every owner of a motor vehicle and every dealer in motor vehicles is required to register with the state highway engineer on or before the 1st of July, 1917. The law requires that each owner of a motor vehicle and each dealer in motor vehicles shall make application to the state highway engineer for registration and eer will furnish application blanks

and after the first of July any person who drives a motor vehicle on, or along or across any public road or street or highway in the State of South Carolina, not duly licensed and registered, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$25.00 or imprisonment for deep breathing; and careful and not more than 15 days for each and every offense.
