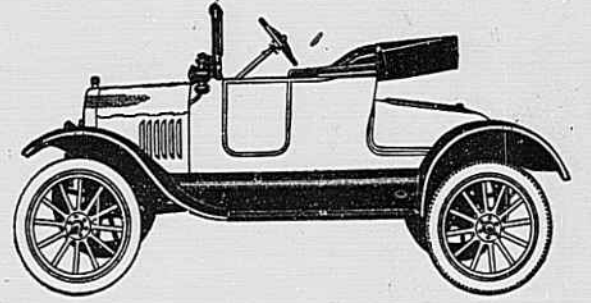

Tobacco Industry Growing.
