Death of an Estimable Lady

Mrs. Gazarine Cauthen, of Heath Springs, widow of the late Capt. John C. Cauthen and an estimable christian lady, died, on Sunday morning last, after a short illness of pneumonia. Mrs. Cauthen was about 75 years of age, and by far the greater part of her long life was a consistent member of the Baptist church and lived a devoted and consecrated christian life. Three children survive her: Philip T., and Prof. Edward F. Cauthen and Mrs. G. W. Beckham. Her remains were interred yesterday in the family burying ground near Pleasant Hill. Homicide Saturday Night

A difficulty occurred in the store of Massey & Adams, in the vicinity of the cotton mill, just outside the corporate limits, on Saturday night last, between Mr. J. F. Griffin and Mr. Mack Robbins, both painters, in which Robbins was cut a number of times about the head and neck, one of the wounds in the left side of the neck severing the jugular vein and causing his death in a few minutes. Statements concerning the difficulty are conflicting. Both men came to this place some years ago from North Carolina. Robbins moved away and only moved back a few weeks ago when he was awarded the contract to paint the new cottages at the cotton mill. He was about 40 years of age and leaves a wife and three little children. His remains were interred here Sunday afternoon.

Mr. Griffin was committed to jail that night. He has employed Green & Hines to defend him.
