

An Act to Allow Unimproved Lands Which Have Not Been on the Tax Books Since The State of South Carolina, 1875 to be Listed Without Penalty. Section 1. Re it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the State of South Carolina, now met and sitting in General Assembly, and by the authority of the same, That in all cases where unimproved land which has not been upon the of the estate of and effects of Mrs. Mary ax books since the fiscal year commencing November 1st, 1875, and which are not on the forfeited list, shall at any time before the 1st day of October, 1888, be returned to the County Auditor for taxation, the said Anditor be, and he is hereby instructed to assess the same and to enter it upon the duplicate of the fiscal year commencing November 1st, 1887, with the simple taxes of that year. Sec. 2. That all such lands as may be not be granted. returned to the Auditor for taxation be-tween the first day of October 1888, and

January A. D. 18889. the first day of October, 1889, shall be assessed and charged with the simple taxes of the two fiscal years commencing respectively on the first day of November, 1887, and the first day of November, 1984. Sec. a That as soon as practicable after the passage of this Act the Comptroller General is directed to furnish a copy of the same to each Auditor in the State, and the Anditors are required to publish the same in each of their county papers once a week for three months during the year 1888, and for the same period of time dur-ing the year 1889; and the cost of such onblication shall be paid by the County Treasurer, upon the order of the County Commissioners, out of the ordinary county
