The Game Law

For the benefit of those interested the Dispatch publishes the "Game Law" that is now in force in this

"It shall not be lawful for any person in this State, between the first day of April and the first day of November in any year hereafter, to catch, kill, or injure, or to pursue with such intent, or to sell or expose for sale, any wild turkey, partridge, quail, woodcock or pheasant; or, between the first day of March and the first day of August, any dove; or at any time during the year, to catch, kill or injure, or to pursue with such intent, by firelight, any of the birds named in this section. And any person so doing shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon convic-tion thereof shall be fined not more than twenty dollars, or be imprisoned not more than thirty days.
