For this service he was made a full general, the highest grade From the summer of 1862 until the spring the amount of additional tax paid by of 1864, he defended Charleston and its outworks when besieged by General Gilmore. At the close of the war he was second in command of Joseph E. Johnson in North Carolina. Since the termination of the war he has r sided in Louisiana. He became president of the New Orleans, Jackson and Mississippi Railroad, and for a number of years was one of the managers of the Louisiana State Lottery, and was also Adjutant General of Louisiana.
