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GENT'S

PRACTICAL LESSONS IN THE LIFE OF JOSEPH.

> Rev. Dr. Talmage Relates In His Usual Vivid Way How He Rose From Obscurity to a High Place-Elevation the Result of Persecution.

WASHINGTON, April 12.-The sermon of Rev. Dr. Talmage today is full of stirring and practical lessons for all. Washington has many men who, like the hero of the texts, started from almost nothing and rose to high place. The texts chosen were: Genesis xxxvii, 28, "They drew and lifted up Joseph out of the pit and sold Joseph to the Ishmaelites for 20 pieces of silver." Genesis xlv, 26, "He is governor over

all the land of Egypt." You cannot keep a good man down. God has decreed for him a certain point of elevation. He will bring him to that though it cost him a thousand worlds. You sometimes find men fearful they will not be properly appreciated. Every man comes to be valued at just what he is worth. You cannot write him up, and you cannot write him down. These facts are powerfully illustrated in my subject. It would be an insult to suppose that you were not all familiar with the life of Joseph-how his jealous brothers threw him into a pit, but seeing a caravan of Arabian merchants trudging along on their camels, with spices and guins that loaded the air with aroma, sold their brother to these merchants, who carried him down into Egypt; Joseph there sold to Potiphar, a man of influence and office; how by Joseph's integrity he raised himself to high position in the realm until, under the false charge of a vile wretch, he was hurled into the penitentiary; how in prison he commanded respect and confidence; how by the interpretation of Pharaoh's dream he was freed and became the chief man in the realm, the Bismarck of his century; how in the time of famine Joseph had the control of a magnificent storehouse, which he had filled during seven years of plenty; how when his brothers, who had thrown him into the pit and sold him into captivity, applied for corn he sent them home with the beasts of burden borne down under the heft of the corn sacks; how the sin

Now, you propose to find the mere caricature of religion, to seek after that which is the mere pretension of a holy life, and you call that religion. I point you to the splendid men and women whom this gospel has blessed and lifted and crowned. Look at the masterpieces of divine grace if you want to know what religion is." Result of Persecution. Only Woes of Agents. Real estate agents tell strange stories

about the houses which are placed in their charge by the owners, who shift on them all care and responsibility, and, for a certain percentage of the receipts, expect the houses to yield the regulation revenue. But sometimes houses will yield nothing but worry and expense. With everything in the way of location and architecture in their favor. houses sometimes remain vacant for long periods, and in many instances the owners blame the agents, but find later that superstition and not laxity on the part

course," an agent said, "when deaths have occurred because of bad sewerage, and where the sanitary conditions are otherwise bad, no one would blame people for remaining away. But houses where a couple of people had died of old age would be looked upon by a certain class as 'unlucky,' and there are thousands who could not be bought to go into spen a house.

"The worst people in that respect," he continued, "are the young mothers. We have had contracts broken because somebody said that 'babies never thrive on that block' and because 'the last family that occupied the flat had twins." But the greatest trouble in that line comes because of Friday and the number 13. When you find a man who will sign a lease on a Friday, you may make up your mind that he will be a good tenant, and that he does not possess any of the qualities of the dreaded kicking tenant. As to the number 13, why, it is as hard to rent a house with that number as one in which there is a cross eyed hallboy or from which a contagious disease flag is

flying." To prove this, the agent told of a beautiful apartment house near Central park, which had been completed recently and for which, despite its advantages as to location and superiority of construction, no tenants could be found, although its less attractive neighbors were occupied. It took the landlord only a short time to learn the cause, and when the number was changed from No. 13 to 111% he found that the home seeking public appreciated his building.



We call upon them to stand with us for the good of those now living and those hereafter to come. It is the duty of every man who loves liberty and the principles of a republican form of government, to stand together in this fight. Let the cry be republican form of government and as a consequence, honest elections; protection to American industries and to American labor, and protection to every citizen of every right guaranteed by the Federal constitution. Add to this a sound currency, sufficient in volume to meet the demand of trade. There are thousands of white men in this State, not now in the Republican party, who are willing to stand upon this platform. We are all willing to stand upon it. We need the help of those white men. There is one thing in the way of our getting that help; a fear of negro domination. They need not fear it, for the negro is willing, if the whites will adopt a proper platform of principle, put out a ticket of their very best men, pledged to reform this government, to support the ticket so put out. Our Republican brothers in Beaufort and Georgetown have carried this out since 1876. Only once did they fail. That was when Ben Tillman went down there and fooled them out of it. 
