

To the Editor of the Dispatch: Departed this life August 6, 1896. in Knoxville, Tennessee, Daniel preached a touching and eloquent Thompson Sease, son of Mr. Daniel sermon from Matthew XXIV; 42. Warner. The interment was made in the Y. M. C. A. lot in Woodlawn cemetery, Knox ville, Tennessee.
