1. All the tangible personal pr perty the State owned or controlled by him. 2. All the tangible property owned by him, or other resident of South Carolina and under his control, which may be temporarily out of the State, but intended to brought into the State. 3. All tan ible personal property owned

or controlled by him which may have been

sent out of the State for sale and not yet

4 All the monies, credits, investments

in bonds, stocks. joint stock companies or otherwise owned or controlled by him, whether in or out of this State. Section 228. Every person required by law to list property shall annually, between the first day of January and the twentieth day of February, make out and deliver to the Auditor of the county in which the property is by law to be returned for taxation, ast to ment, venti-d by his oath, of all the real estate which has been sold or transferred since the last fistment of property for which he was responsible, and to whom, and of all the personal property possessed by him, or under his control, on the first day of January of each year, either as owner, agent, parent, husband, guardian, executor, administrator, trustee, receiver, officer, partner, factor or holder, with the value thereof, on the said first day of Janpary at the place of return, estimating according to the rule: prescribed by law: Provided. That the returns of the following agricultural products, to wit: corn, cotton, wheat, oats, rice, peas and long forage, made on the day specified by law, shall be of the amounts thereof actually on hand on the first day of August immediately preceding the date of said re-

turns; but this provision shall apply only

to such products as are actually in the

hands of the producer thereof.

Section 229 Any person who shall, at my place in the State, be engaged in the business of buying and selling personal property, or in selling personal property consigned to him from any place out of the State, or property not the product of this State consigned to him from any place within the State, shall be held to be a merchant and at the sametime he is required to list his other personal property, shall de-liver to the Auditor of the county in which his place of business is situated a statement, under his oath; of the average monthly value of the personal property, monies and credits, pertaining to his mer cantile business; to ascertain which he shall set down the value on hand on the first day of January of the preceding year, or other time of commencing business during the year, add thereto all purchases, when made at cost, ascertain the average value on hand for the month, deduct the average amount of sales for the mouth, at cost, and the remainder shall be the average on hand for that month; and in a like manner, ascertain the average value for each month down to the first day of January of the year in which the r turn is to be in .de, add together such monthly values, divide the aggregate by the number of months he has been in business during the preceding year as aforesaid, and to the quotient add the monies and credits on hand the first day of January of the year in which the return is made, and the product of this last addition shall be the sum upon which he shall pay taxes for the year in which the return is made: Provided That when business is opened after the first day of January of the preceding year and closed before the first ay of January of the year in which the return is made, the parties opening and closing such business shall make return on merchandise the time of opening and closing such business being the times u-ed as the basis of the return as established in

Section 270 of the law in reference to the sessment of taxes, (Revised Statutes) All property shall be valued for taxation

at its true value in money, which, in all cases not specially provided for by law, shall be held to be as follows, to wit: For personal property the usual seiling price on the usual terms of similar property at administrators or executors' sales, at the place where the return is read; and for real property, the usual selling price on the ususal terms of similar property at sales for partition under the order of court, at the place where the return is to be made. It there is no selling price, then at what is honestly believed could be obtained for the same at a fair sale under the conditions above mentioned.
