

morning for \$1,500 for Mrs. Easter. The next case was Martha E. Bickley vs. Acquilla Derrick, in which the jury returned a verdict of \$130 20 for plaintiff. Mr. Graham represented the plaintiff and Mr. Wingard the defendant.

Some few equity cases were heard, after which the court at 6 p. m. vesterday adjourned sine die.


