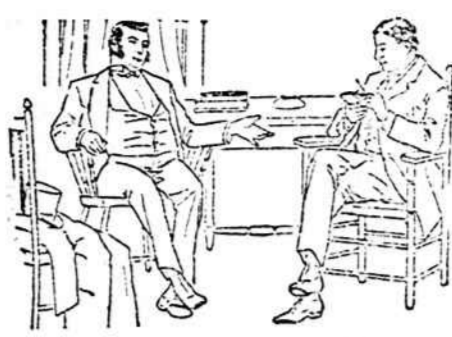

Prohibition Platform.

We, the Prohibition Democrats, of the State of South Carolina, in conference assembled, hereby declare the following platform:
 1. That competency, honesty and sobriety are indispensable qualifications for holding office.
 2. That taxes should be made as low as possible, consistent with efficiency of government.
 3. That the sale of intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes is not a function of government, but a disgrace to Christian civilization; a dishonor to manhood, and a political wrong of unparalleled enormity; that it is an awful crime against the women and children, against the home, against the Church and against God.
 4. That prohibition of the sale of intoxicating liquors, for beverage purposes, is the true, consistent remedy, and to this end we demand that the dispensary system be shorn of its evils, such as selling intoxicants a beverage; and that authority be given by the General Assembly for the State to sell alcoholic liquors for only medicinal, mechanical and sacramental purposes.

Klondike's Trip to Hot Springs.

To the Editor of the Dispatch:
 "I am with you once again, my friend. No more my footsteps roam. Where it began my journey ends Amid the scenes of home."
 On the 9th of May we started for the Southern Baptist Convention which met at Hot Springs, Ark.
 We feel ourselves very fortunate indeed to go so near the "Wild and Woolly West" and get back home unscathed.
 Most of the messengers from the churches—the Carolinians and Georgians—met in Atlanta and took a special train called "The Baptist Special," and left Atlanta at 4 o'clock p. m., Wednesday, May 9th and did not change cars all the way to Hot Springs, arriving there Thursday, May 10, at 8 o'clock p. m.
 The scenery along the way was just grand. The first object of interest was "Stone Mountain" in Georgia, which must be seen in order to appreciate it. Here is stone enough to build a "Chinese Wall" Near Dalton, Georgia, we ran through a short tunnel in the mountain.
 We did not reach Chattanooga, Tenn., until just about dark. The city was beautifully decorated with brilliant electric lights which presented a magnificent appearance to our jolly crew of passengers. On leaving here most of the passengers were well satisfied with eight seeing and betook themselves to the land of dreams. Masters, I believe, was the only man that did not sleep and he was cutting the Courier.
 Over this part of the way, which is the most historic, is passed in the night. As the sun rose we were nearing Memphis, Tenn., and all eyes looked just a little drowsy. After a short stop we were moving on again in open view to the grand majestic old Mississippi river.
 A feeling of sadness came over the writer as we were passing over the old stream. Here beneath its gentle bosom sleeps De Sota, the first white man that came through the wilderness to the "Father of Waters." And up and down this river the Red Men used to ply his canoe, dreaming of his dusky man, true and brave.
 The train was just three minutes crossing the long iron bridge which spans the river. Then for two hours we were moving on through swamps that must extend at least seventy-five miles from the river.
 We are now in Arkansas and the wide and broad prairie lands open up before us, on which are feeding numerous herds of cattle and flocks of sheep. Little Rock was reached in the evening of the 10th and after a short stop of 45 minutes we made our last drive for "Hot Springs." Just as soon as our train rolled up to the Conact depot we were met by a special committee who gave us all the information we needed at one time. Everybody was bustling around for a place to spend the night. Hot Springs is in many respects the most remarkable city in the United States. Notwithstanding the place has only about 15,000, there are 100 and about as many boarding houses and restaurants. The great Eastman hotel accommodates about 2,000 guests. There are many other very large hotels. One man said, "By boarders we live, and without boarders we can do nothing." The thing that has made the place famous the world over is the hot water. There are here seventy-two hot water springs. The water just as it comes out of the ground will boil an egg done in twenty minutes. Surely this place must be near—Tirer del Fogo. The Tater has great medicinal qualities and consequently many people from all parts of the world come here to take the hot water baths and to drink the hot water.
 Uncle Sam foresaw the worth of the waters and so he reserved all rights to himself, and thanks to him, every one can drink just as much hot water as he can hold and it will

not cost him a cent. There are a great many bath houses here. Most all of the messengers took a course of bathing, which, by the way, was free to the messengers. Klondike was a little jibous, but at last from a great need personally he was persuaded to be submerged beneath the hot water, and then came the worst scrubbing he ever got.
 Here you can not only see people from most every place under the sun but representatives of most every kind of disease known to man.
 The streets are crowded with these people—some on crutches and rolling chairs and some crawling on their hands and knees. Some of them present a most pitiable appearance. Will some one of the Dispatch readers please tell me why these waters are hot. At one place there is a cool water spring and a hot water spring very close together.
 One of the attractions of the place is "Happy Hollow." Here most every kind of amusement is going on and you can see and hear it free of cost. There are here many wild animals—tame. Little log huts—fit representatives of the first settlers—are built all up the valley.
