In Memoriam.

Capt. J. C I Wannamaker, so well and favorably known to the people of Lexington, has passed to his reward and left a great void in the hearts of a host of surviving relatives and friends who learned to love and admire him for his openness of charac ter and his honest, upright life. He was generous at all times and ever ready to extend a helping hand to the needy and suffering. Frank and open in his life and conduct, no one was ever left in doubt as to his views and opinions, as he never sought to conceal or cover up any act. There was no home anywhere more hospitable than where he presided with the quiet dignity open hearted and chivalric old time Carolina gentleman. If Captain Wannamaker was proud of any thing, it was of his splendid war record, as he had the right to be.

He was First Lieutenant of Company B, 1st Regiment, S. C V, of the Confederate army. This regiment became a part of the famous Jenkins' Brigade and fought through many of the bloodist battles of the

Fredricksburg, Chancellorsville, Spottsylvanis, Fort Harrison, Knexville, Lookout Mountain and other fields witnessed the splendid cour age of its historic battalions, and i is a remarkable fact that the subject of this sketch was present with his command in every engagement in which it participated and was for much of the time in command of his company. His men were devoted to him, and this is not surprising when he labored so constantly and earnesty for the welfare of his gallant command.

In a basty retreat and under a dreadful fire at the Wilderness, he paused and gave water to his wounded men who were unable to fall back, and leaving his nearly emptied canteen in the hands of a mortally wounded comrade, rejoined his com-

He stood by the gallant Kaigler who, when his flagstaff was crushed by a bullet, seized the falling colors and carried them steadily onward.

To write of his many gallant deeds would be to rewrite largely of all the many battles through which he passed. His chivalric courage and his loyalty and unswerving patriotism were subjects of common remark among his surviving comrades. He was chosen commander of Camp Kaigler by an unanimous vote and held the position at his demise. He had nearly lived out his allotted time being in his sixty-ninth year when he passed away. He was a large and successful planter, a useful and publie spirited citizen and a kind a warm hearted neighbor. We shall all miss him, but the loved ones of his own household must feel the blow most. The vacant chair is there. The loving husband, the devoted, affectionate father is gone. The impress of his life, however, is still there, and the cultured and interesting family left behind bear the evidences of his loving and tender care.

The remains were interred in the cemetery of the St. Andrew chapel church by the Masonic brotherhood in the presence of a large concourse of friends and relatives on May 2nd, 1900, the day after his departue.

We hope to be able to emulate his virtues, which were many; his faults, which were few, we bury with him. W. T. Brcoker.






