TAX RETURNS.

1901.

IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE LAW in reference to the assessment and taxation of property, the Auditor, or his assistant, will be and attend the following named places for the purpose of receiving tax returns for the year 1901, and in order to meet the next appointment the hour will close at 11:30 in the morning and at 4 o'clock in the afternoon; taxpayers will, therefore, be prompt in meeting the appointments so as not to cause delay. Tax payers will please come prepared to give the name of their township and number of school district wherein they reside. Lexington C. H., from January 1st to the 6th, 1901. Archie Wolf's, morning, January 31st. W. W. Martin's, afternoon, January 31st. S. P. Shumper, morning, February 1st. Brook and, all day, February 2nd. Lexington from the 4th to the 20th. Section 270 of the law in reference to the assessment of taxes, (Revised Statutes.) reads as follows: All property shall be valued for taxation at its true value in money, which in all cases not specially provided for by law shall be held to be as follows, to wit: For personal property the usual selling price on the usual terms of similar property at the place where the return is made; and for real property, the usual selling price on the usual terms of similar property at sales for partition under order of court, at the place where the return is to be made. If there is no usual selling price, then at what is honestly believed could be obtained for the same at a fair sale under the conditions above mentioned. It shall be the duty of each owner of lands, and of any new structures thereon which shall not have been appraised for taxation, to list the same for taxation with the County Auditor for the County in which they may be situated, on or before the 20th day of February next, after the same shall become subject to taxation. Section 271 of the law reads as follows: From and after the passage of this act, there shall be assessed upon all taxable polls in this State a tax of one dollar on each poll, the proceeds of which tax shall be applied solely to educational purposes. Every male citizen between the ages of twenty-one and sixty years, except those incapable of earning a support, from being married or from other legal causes, shall be liable to taxation, except by law, shall be deemed taxable polls. All returns for taxation must be filed with the Auditor not later than February 20th, 1901, after that date the law requires an addition of 50 per cent. to the last year's return. Township Board of Assessors will meet at some convenient place in each township on township on Wednesday, March 7, 1901.
