Two of Batesburg's Prominent Citizens Dead.

To the Editor of the Dispatch: William Brooker Plunkett was born in that portion of our county known as "new Lexington", now a part of Aiken county.

Returning home at the end of the war he went with his uncle of honored memory (William Merritt, Sr.) to Aiken where for some years he was engaged in the mercantile business.

In June, 1863, he came to Batesburg and has since then been one of our best citizens. His life was upright, almost perfect, in all his dealings with his fellow men.

There was wild excitement and sensational changes in the corn market of New York on July 13th. The bulls were demoralized and their boom collapsed, severely injuring many traders financially.

He was baptized into the membership of old Mt. Ebal Baptist church by the Rev. Mr. Shaw (of blessed memory) in August or September, 1836. Since then he has been a consistent member, moving his connection to the Batesburg church.
