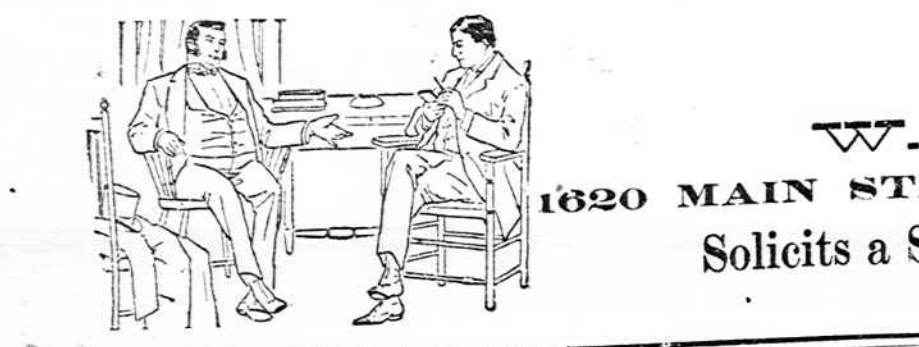

 The Southern Oil Company is offering 18 cents for cotton seed. Counting 60¢ bushels to the ton that is \$12 a ton. If the same farmer should take his \$12 and purchase the seed and hulls from that ton he would find that it takes two to trade. If the farmer cannot get one-fourth more seed and hulls than his ton of seed contains, he will have to do all his hauling for nothing. Let farmers bear in mind that the products of one ton of seed at present prices is worth \$24 to \$26. It does seem that the mills ought to grind the seed for one-third that amount. Remember that seed are just as good for cattle or manure without being crushed.—Carolina Spartan.
