
This being true it follows that every person who voted in the last primary is under a moral, if not legal obligation to support the choice



They are driven out of houses almost like dogs; still they go on canvassing as if nothing had happened. of us. Our Methodist brethren here quarrel and disagreed and several of their churches have nearly gone to pieces, and the Baptist are doing no better. The Universalist seem to be apparently ind fferent, and, of course the Mormons are making some headway,
