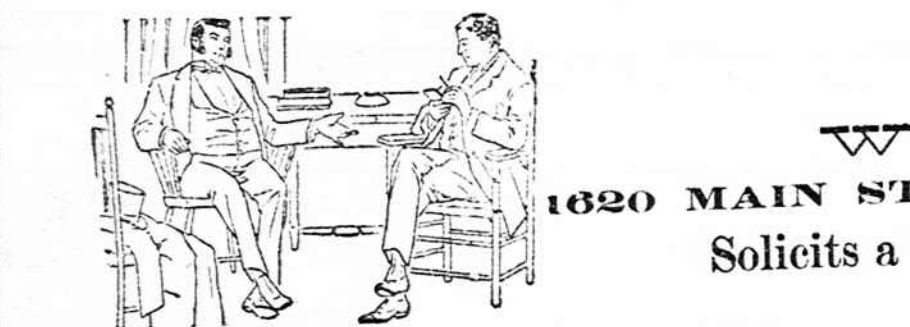

"Scraps of History."

GREGORY CLARK
 So long a time has passed since the death of this splendid specimen of the Revolutionary patriot that little can be learned of his history.

Tradition ranks him among the more gallant heroes of the War of Independence while the record is silent as to his glorious achievements it must be true that he was a brave and dashing Continental officer.

It is known that he came from Sampson county, in North Carolina, and that he served under Greene until the close of hostilities when he was honorably discharged at Pocatigo in Beaufort county. He returned to his home, but soon after moved back to Pocatigo with his father, Charles Clark, and lived there two years. They then moved to Lexington and Gregory, or "Grigg" Clark as he was familiarly called, camped first on the south side of Congaree creek where the road from Orangeburg to Lexington crosses that stream and near the old Henry Bachman place. Mr. Grigg Shes lives now near the spot where he first "settled." Just how long he remained here is not told but he moved subsequently to Turkey creek, near Nazareth church, six miles from Lexington C. H., on the Barwell road.

He had married Lurenia Parker before leaving North Carolina. Eight children were born to this venerable pair, two boys and six girls.

Parker moved west. Cornelius married Nancy Lee; Sarah was married to John Berry; Rachel to Jonathan Taylor; Clara to Mr. Seay; Nancy to David Shot; Fannie and Katie were married to two brothers Arnold. Cornelius reared twelve children most of whom moved west. James J. and Andrew J., remained in Lexington.

Col. James J. Clark was in public life for a long while and was widely and favorably known. He was postmaster for part of his life and served efficiently as Magistrate for a time. He was once elected to the House of Representatives. He was a highly respected and useful man. His eleven children are all still living and are among our best people.

Andrew J. was a worthy son of a line of patriots and left an honored name. He reared twelve children all of whom are living.

The descendants of the subject of this brief sketch are very numerous and are worthy scions of the honored family tree.

"Grigg" lived to be eighty years old and died from an injury received in falling from his door, his hip being fractured. He and his wife are buried at Nazareth church.

There are those now living who have heard "grandfather Grigg" relate with thrilling interest many of the stirring incidents of the Revolutionary struggle and have listened with rapture as he sang his old war songs. He was widely known and exceedingly popular. His hospitality amounting almost to prodigality was proverbial. He had perhaps the finest orchard in the county and was fond of his "hard cider," and all his friends and neighbors were as welcome to his refreshing and harmless drinks as they were to the sparkling waters of Turkey creek. His kindness and generosity endeared him to everybody and his memory is cherished fondly till now. W. T. B. Swanes, S. C., Oct. 16, 1901.

General News Items.

Ohio, New Jersey, Maryland, Massachusetts and Virginia are to have elections this month.

The reports that King Edward VII is suffering from cancer of the throat seem to be well founded.

The Georgia house now in session has voted by 132 to 22 to forbid the sale of cigarettes in that State.

Three persons were killed and one seriously injured by a railroad collision at Oakwood, Wis., Sunday.

Queen Wilhelmina has already received from her loyal subjects a \$10,000 cradle, made of gold, silver and pearl.

The presents at the wedding of John D. Rockefeller, jr., to the daughter of Senator Aldrich were estimated at \$700,000.

Three territories are going to knock at the door of congress next winter for admission as States—Arizona, New Mexico and Oklahoma.

In a single day the taxes paid in New York city amounted to \$15,000,000. No wonder Tammany is willing to spend a million to get to handle it.

Three trains have been chartered in Buffalo to convey nearly two thousand people from the Pan American Midway to the Charleston exposition early next month.
