Death of Mr. George.

After an illness extending through several years, Mr. Dederick George who re-ided near this place calmly and peacefully died at his home last Saturday. Mr. George was one of our best known and successful farmers and by his thrift and industrious habits had accumulated a good store of this world's goods. He was a man of the strictest integrity, was of a social and genial disposition, these characteristics won for him a large circle of friends. He was a gallant Confederate soldier and served with conspicuous bravery from the beginning to the end of hostilities. At the time of his enlistment only two other citizens of this county joined the company with which he was connected, they being Dr. C. E. Leaphart and Mr. Fred Harman. He was about 56 years of age and leaves a wife and eleven children. His funeral services were conducted at his home Sunday morning in the presence of between 400 and 500 people the Rev. W. D. Quick officiating. The funeral procession was from 1/2 to 1 mile in length. The interment was in the family burying ground near the residence of his brother Mr. Erby J. George. Beside his immediate family, Mr. George leaves a large family connection who, together with his friends and acquaintances mourn with those who mourn. He "died like one who wraps the drapery of his couch about him and lies down to pleasant dreams."

A Deplorable Affair.

Last Wednesday afternoon, after the Dispatch had gone to press, we received the intelligence that E. L. Asbill, a rising young attorney of the Lexington Bar, was shot and probably fatally injured by Mr. C. W. Sollee, a prominent merchant at Batesburg. The shooting occurred on Mr. Sollee's plantation in Saluda county, a short distance across the line and was the result of a misunderstanding between the two parties. Mr. Sollee and a negro tenant of his became involved in a dispute over a division of the crops and Mr. Asbill had been retained to look after the interest of the negro and was on his way to consult his client when he met Mr. Sollee in the road where the shooting occurred. The weapon used was a 44 calibre and Mr. Asbill was shot in the back, the ball passing through the left lung and has not been found. He is in a critical condition, but hopes are entertained for his recovery. Mr. Sollee was given a preliminary hearing before Magistrate C. C. Wise, and was admitted to bail in the sum of \$500. The shooting is deplored by the friends of both parties and regret is expressed on all sides.
