Go Slow.

South Carolina has rich resources which are being developed by the magic wand of capital. Without capital they would lie idle and profitless. Their development increases the riches of the State, provides employment for her sons and benefits all interests. There is no reason for

showing special favors to capital, but there is no sense in treating it with undue harshness. Water travels in the direction of least resistance and capital has a somewhat similar characteristic. It will not seek investment under adverse circumstances. In recent years much capital has come into South Carolina for investment and home people have been keeping their money busy developing various industries.

The figures are not available, but there has been a tremendous increase in the corporate capital of this State during the last ten years. The fertilizer and cotton manufacture industries have been more highly developed than any others. This seems to have made them the especial targets for those legislators who are possessed with the notion that the way to gain and retain the support of the "poor, dear people" is to devise legislation whose effect it will be to give corporations trouble.

There are politicians who care naught for the general effect of legislation so long as it has special result of landing them in office. It would not feaze them if they got a five thousand dollar office by crippling a million dollar industry by legislation devised to please the fancied prejudice of the masses. While South Carolina's natural resources make fertilizer factories and cotton mills prosperous in this State, they are not sufficient to overcome the evil effects of inimical legislation, and such legislation will cripple further growth of those industries and tend to make capital go elsewhere for investment in them.
